

Improving Access to Local Government Information in District 1

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City council meetings are where local officials debate policies, pass laws, manage the city's budget, and vote on community issues. However, working families and youth are often underrepresented in these important meetings, which raises questions about their accessibility and how they can be improved so all community voices are heard. District 1 covers the cities of Pleasanton, Livermore, Fremont, and Sunol's unincorporated areas. The district includes a diverse population of immigrant, working-class, multilingual families, and students.

City council decisions directly impact these communities. Most city council meetings are held twice a month and offer livestream or hybrid access. However, meetings are often long, lasting 2–4 hours, and include agendas of 100+ pages of technical language; many residents do not know when meetings occur or what will be discussed, and information is often spread across multiple websites and agendas that are not beginner-friendly. Although city council meetings are officially open to the public, their design can create unintentional barriers that make it difficult for certain groups to fully participate.

As a student from a multilingual immigrant family, I have seen how decisions made without the voices of certain communities can shape and affect our daily lives in meaningful ways. This issue is becoming more important as District 1 becomes more

diverse and increasingly relies on online systems for public information, while participation from students and working families remains low due to barriers to access. Improving access to local government information is important to ensure fair representation and better informed decision making at the county level.

Many residents feel powerless or unsure of what to do to make a difference in their community. Although many citizens feel as if their voices don't matter, communicating directly with elected officials, participating in decision-making, and working to ensure that policies meet community needs is crucial. Attending city council meetings and submitting a public comment is a great opportunity for residents to speak directly to elected officials during a meeting. Community members can share their opinions or recommendations about issues affecting their city.

Submitting comments also allows for new perspectives to be considered. Locals are given the opportunity to share their personal facts, data, and lived experiences that could be overlooked during the process. Increased participation will ensure the turnout people want. Numbers show officials that your story isn't an anomaly and that many people resonate with it. For locals, personal experience is one of the most powerful advocacy tools. They help shed light on possible unintended consequences a new regulation might impose on communities and the city.

This humanizes issues that are often overlooked as another problem needing attention. When people hear your thoughts and see the effort you took to share your

opinions for the benefit of your community, it makes your words stand out. Participation from the public also ensures that government officials are honest and open about the possibilities surrounding critical issues. This transparency can lead to a more trusting and productive city council, one in which locals and officials can both rely on each other with confidence.

My solution was to create an easy and user-friendly website that makes city council meeting information more accessible to District 1 residents, especially students and working families. The website has key information such as upcoming meeting schedules with important links and information about how local government works. It also includes guides on how to attend meetings, access livestreams, and participate in public comment. Overall, the website aims to reduce barriers to civic participation and help community members stay more engaged and involved with their local government.
